Access to Government Documents in SA

This factsheet sets out what information relating to the environment is available to the public under South Australian legislation. Many environmental and other Acts allow the public to access certain documents either on application or through a "public register". In some circumstances, information may not be readily available in which case it may be necessary to use the procedures established under *the Freedom of Information Act 1991* (SA).

Registers of information

Pollution

The <u>Environment Protection Act 1993 (SA)</u>¹ and the <u>Environmental Protection Regulations</u> 2009 (SA)² require the keeping of a "public register" of information containing:

- details of incidents causing or threatening serious or material environmental harm that come to the notice of the Environment Protection Authority (**EPA**) including any remedial action taken or proposed
- details of any environment protection order, clean-up order or clean-up authorisation issued by the EPA and any consequent action taken including a report on compliance with the order issued
- details of prosecutions (nature of the offence, name of proceedings, action number, name of court, outcome), copies of written warnings and other enforcement action

- details of each application for an environmental authorisation (i.e. licenses, exemptions or works approval) and development authorisations, the outcome of these applications and (if granted) details of any conditions attaching to those authorisations; and
- details of reports of environmental assessments carried out for purposes of voluntary site contamination and remediation, or carried out for any other purpose.

Note: A small fee applies for inspecting the Register and taking copies.

Public and Environmental Health

Each local council is required to submit a report every year to the South Australian Health Commission on their work under the <u>Public and Environmental Health Act 2011 (SA</u>). The report outlines the state of environmental and public health in the local council area and details of measures taken by the council to address any problems.

The EPA responsible for the keeping of a register of licences and registrations granted under the *Radiation Protection and Control Act 2021* (SA). This register contains such information as where unsealed radioactive substances are handled and kept, who has a licence to mine or mill radioactive ores and who has a licence to use or handle radioactive substances.

Development

The Planning and Land Use Services (Attorney-General's Department) is required to keep a register of applications under the <u>Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016</u> (SA).

Where a development is of a type that requires neighbour or public notice, certain additional information such as plans and specifications, must also be made available for public inspection.

State Heritage

The <u>Heritage Places Act 1993 (SA)</u> provides for the keeping of the "State Heritage Register". The Register has an inventory attached to it containing information relating to State Heritage Areas, local heritage (as designated in Development Plans) and Commonwealth heritage sites.

Aboriginal Heritage & Native Title

The <u>Aboriginal Heritage Act 1988 (SA)</u> creates central and local archives relating to Aboriginal heritage, including a "Register of Aboriginal Sites and Objects".³ This information is confidential and can only be disclosed in certain circumstances such as where the traditional owners of the site or object have given their approval for disclosure.

The <u>Native Title (South Australia) Act 1994 (SA)</u> established the "State Native Title Register".⁴ The register contains all decisions by South Australian courts, and authorities under the law of the Commonwealth, on questions about the existence of native title in South Australia or the nature of the rights conferred by native title.

Once it has been determined that native title does exist in the land, then the Register will contain a description of the persons who are recognised at common law as the holders of native title in the land and a description of the nature and extent of the rights and interests conferred by the native title. The register also includes details of all current claims to native title.

Mining and Petroleum Projects

The <u>Mining Act 1971 (SA)</u> established a register of miners' rights, precious stones prospecting permits, registered claims, mineral exploration licences and mining leases. The <u>Petroleum and Geothermal Act 2000 (SA)</u> established a similar register for petroleum projects.

Native Vegetation clearance

The Native Vegetation Council keeps a register of applications for permission to clear native vegetation under *the <u>Native Vegetation Act 1991 (SA)</u>*. The Register also contains a list of land subject to heritage agreements for the protection of native vegetation.

Coastal conservation

The Coast Protection Board prepares and issues bulletins, information sheets, maps and plans as required by section 14 of the <u>Coast Protection Act 1972 (SA)</u>.

Fisheries & National Parks

The Fisheries and Aquaculture division of the SA Department of Primary Industries and Regions is required to keep a Register of commercial fishing licences.

Environment, Resources and Development Court

The Environment, Resources and Development Court must allow any member of the public, on application, to inspect certain documents. These include any process relating to proceedings and forming part of the Court's records, a transcript of evidence taken by the Court in any proceedings and any documentary material admitted into evidence in any proceedings. Decisions or orders of the Court are available, however some other documents can only be inspected with the permission of the Court.
